

Maryland Families are Facing a Housing Crisis

The shortage of 120,000 housing units in Maryland will only grow without an intentional plan to address:

- higher construction costs,
- an aging housing stock, and
- rising interest rates.
- Marylanders are facing increasing rent and home prices.
- The pathway to homeownership is decreasing as more than 51% of Maryland renters are cost-burdened, spending 30% or more of their hard-earned wages on housing-related costs.
- The State must **comprehensively** tackle the housing supply issue to increase affordable housing and create pathways for renters to become homeowners.



Interconnected Response

House the Most Vulnerable

The impact of scarce housing and disinvestment in neighborhoods is most significantly felt by the most vulnerable populations: individuals with disabilities, seniors, veterans, children, returning citizens.

Tackle the affordable housing shortage

Rapidly rising rents, record high assessments, and bidding wars are symptoms of a massive supply shortage that has been worsening since the Great Recession and amplified by the pandemic.


Build wealth through homeownership

To help focus that work on the neighborhoods and families who have historically been robbed of wealth, we will take bold action to address those policies.

Revitalize disinvested communities

Deliberate decisions made by policy-makers sought to divide communities by race and resulted in America's commerce hubs, like Baltimore, with vacancy and decay.

Make Housing Affordable and Accessible

SYMPTOMS OF SUPPLY SHORTAGE

Rapidly rising rents, record high assessments, and bidding wars.

UNDERLYING CAUSE

A failure to build due to:

- Cost
- Local Barriers

HARDEST HIT

While a shortage exists in all types of housing and at every price point, the burden is shouldered by the lowest-income households.

Washington County Highlights

State Fiscal Years 2020-2023 - Affordable Rental Housing

- Four communities financed.
 - More than 300 affordable units created for working families, seniors, and individuals with disabilities.
 - Estimated total project costs of \$81 million.
- More than \$65 million in financing was administered by DHCD:
 - Federal Low-Income Housing Tax Credits with an estimated equity value of more than \$40 million;
 - Bond funding of more than \$13.5 million;
 - And \$12 million in State Rental Housing Funds






















Revitalize Disinvested Communities

Create Opportunities

SYMPTOMS

America's centers of commerce, innovation, and culture are too often associated with images of vacancy and decay.

UNDERLYING CAUSE

This was the result of deliberate decisions made by policy-makers seeking to divide communities by race.

HARDEST HIT

Baltimore is one such hub, and on a smaller scale, so are many other Maryland communities.

Washington County Highlights

State Fiscal Years 2020-2023 - Community Revitalization

- More than \$30 million in State Revitalization Program funds were awarded to support
 116 projects and activities with total costs estimated at nearly \$58 million.
- Nearly \$3.5 million in Project Restore grants awarded as incentives for 53 businesses to open or expand in vacant properties, including Atomic Pencil Aleworks, Grind Skate Co., NeverBored Games, and South In Ur Mouth Catering and baked goods.
- Neighborhood BusinessWorks program financing to support revitalization of the Pythian Castle building and the growth of Crist Instrument Co., a manufacturer of biomedical research instruments.





House the Most Vulnerable Marylanders

+

Provide shelter for all

SYMPTOMS

Too few homes means that more Marylanders are homeless.



Scarce housing and disinvestment in neighborhoods have divided the course of Maryland families based on their race.

HARDEST HIT

The most vulnerable populations: individuals with disabilities, seniors, veterans, children, returning citizens.

Washington County Highlights

State Fiscal Years 2020-2023 - Homelessness Prevention

- More than \$2.4 million from the Homelessness Solutions Program to the Washington County Community Action Council for services and shelter for individuals and families that are homeless or in danger of becoming homeless.
- Administered nearly \$16 million in Emergency Rental Assistance Program funds to Washington County to assist more than 3,800 households,





Washington County Highlights

State Fiscal Years 2020-2023 - Affordable Homeownership



- Nearly 450 loans through the Maryland Mortgage Program.
- **\$82 million** in safe, sustainable mortgages, primarily to first-time homebuyers.
- More than 80% of borrowers received \$2.4 million in additional down payment and closing cost assistance.



Build Wealth Through Homeownership

Lower Barriers for Homeowners

SYMPTOMS

Lower homeownership rates in some communities, record high assessments, bidding wars, increases in home sale prices and down payments.

UNDERLYING CAUSE

Historical inequitable policies, competitive market leaving those with less behind.

HARDEST HIT

Black and Hispanic households.

Connect All Marylanders

Connecting All Marylanders

Not All Marylanders Have Internet Access

SYMPTOMS

Lower rates of internet accessibility in more rural, harder to access parts of the state

UNDERLYING CAUSE

Higher costs for internet service providers to connect certain households

HARDEST HIT

Lower income households

Washington County Highlights

Office of Statewide Broadband Highlights

- Recently, the Department has awarded \$1,042,995 to Verizon to connect 481 previously unserved or underserved households and businesses in Washington County. The total project cost is \$2,128,562.
- In FY22, DHCD also awarded Antietam Cable about \$4,650,420 for Antietam Rural Broadband Extensions in Washington County through the Network Infrastructure Grant Program Awards.
- And awarded two awards in the county through the Maryland Emergency Education Relief Grant (MEER), which provides grants to K-12 students and school staff to close the gaps for those who lack necessary access to the internet and devices.
 - \$87,942.59 toward Cedar Ridge Children's Home & School Inc. and
 - \$330,940 Washington County Washington County Board of Education.

Our community voices are being heard (Nearly 2,500 petition signatures and 750 members on Facebook page)

The Acting Superintendent at Antietam National Battlefield expressed gratitude for our participation in Phase I of the Salute event evaluation. They acknowledged and valued our passion for the event and the desire to bring it back to the park.

The NPS, in collaboration with the National Capital Regional Office and the Department of Interior's Collaborative Action and Dispute Resolution Office, is securing extra funding to obtain facilitation services/support for Phase II. This phase will encompass all major event aspects, including addressing fire and life safety concerns in the coming weeks.


